Launch of the 'Practical Parrot Action' Project

The Broken Boosey CMN's Communities for Nature funded project 'Practical Parrot Action' was officially launched in Glenrowan on Sunday May 4th by Member for Benalla Dr Bill Sykes, in front of a crowd of 95 enthusiastic locals.

This two-year project, co-ordinated by the Broken Boosey Conservation Management Network and Chris Tzaros from *Birds, Bush and Beyond,* will provide grants to landholders for nest boxes, fencing to protect remnant vegetation, and revegetation to provide habitat corridors across the landscape for these beautiful birds.

The launch, included a nest box display, museum specimens, 'Neo' the Turquoise Parrot handing out "eggs", the announcement of the winners of a colouring completion and morning tea





catered by the Glenrowan Primary School Parent Club, followed by a barbecue lunch fundraiser for the Glenrowan-Warby Ranges Lions Club. The community heard MP Dr well-known Bill Sykes, wildlife ecologist Chris Tzaros and local landholder Graham Colson talk about the turquoise parrot, and the importance and benefits of projects like these. Fifty-three people 'signed up' on the day as interested participants in the project, which is a wonderful response. Many thanks to all our participants and attendees, and the community groups who attended and made the morning a highly successful one!

'Destination Chesney Vale'

'Destination Chesney Vale' took place in March at the Winton Wetlands, with 94 people attending to take a tour of the wetlands, and listen to ecologist Chris Tzaros present on the various migratory species that depend on the wetlands and the Chesney Vale region.

One of the aims of the day was to highlight to people that the wetlands – when they're dry as well as wet – are vital to the ecology for not only local species, but distant, migratory species.



Birds such as the Latham's Snipe and the Sharp-tailed Sandpiper that breed in Japan and Siberia migrate to Australian wetlands for their non-breeding period, which is our spring and summer. These birds as well as others like the Red-necked Stint that breed along the coastlines of Eurasia, feed and grow strong for the flight home to the Northern Hemisphere. Chris also showed people the best spots to look for birds at the wetlands.

As Chris says, "It takes time and patience to see these birds, but the wait is worth it. lt's incredible to think that a tiny bird has flown 15,000 kilometres - or more - to reach the Winton Wetlands." - Geomorphology, hydrology and hydraulics of floodplains
- Floodplain soils
- Floodplain vegetation
- Floodplain fauna
- Biogeochemical processes and functions on the floodplain
