


LIFE IS BUSY AT HAMILTON PARK

WELL DONE JO

WATER DISTRIBUTION A number of maintenance duties have been carried out over the past months. These have included cleaning out a number of meters that had low pressure or dirty water and flushing out a number of hydrants to remove sediment and odor problems. This issue may have been caused by rotting vegetation caught in the system over a wet winter. Many thanks to Pete Janas who has assisted with the maintenance. Meters have been read and accounts sent out.



NATIVE VEGETATION GROUP

This group of volunteers contribute many hours to maintain our native vegetation . In October they removed eucalyptus regrowth (zone 34), removed some rabbit burrows and removed weeds in an area (three corned garlic listed noxious) . November saw them treat invasive pasture grasses before seed set ,monitor for St. Johns Wort (various localities) remove log stacks (to reduce rabbit habitat and fire danger) . The Community extends it's appreciation to this hard working group .

From the Chairperson

As we enter the festive period we can sit back and enjoy the successes of the year, we have managed to achieve this despite the restrictive times we have been living with. One of these successes are the thinning project for our bushlands and the subsequent clearing of all the heads and felled timber. This has been a big project and one that will continue into next year as we complete the clean-up and maintain the bushland into the future.

We have had to postpone the 50th celebration, but we hope to be able to hold it in Autumn next year, along with the launch of our Hamilton Park Book. This has been a mammoth task, collecting photos and stories from old residents, and has progressed around the restrictions of the pandemic. The next newsletter will have more details so stay tuned.

Over the COVID period, with the reduced face to face school times we have seen the building of bike jumps around the park, mostly around the pruning pile area. The board had hoped to partner with the riders to make the pruning pile area an accepted area for jumps, but after consultation with our insurer we have been advised that the underwriters won't accept the risk for bike jumps that haven't been professionally designed and installed.

The safety of residents is of paramount importance to the board, but so is the elimination of legal action against the Co-Operative. This unfortunately leaves us with no option but to insist that no further jumps be constructed, if they are we will be obliged to remove them. This may seem harsh at first, but if we don't take this action the Co-Operative, of which we are all members, could be exposed to legal action. The board has agreed that this risk cannot not be accepted on behalf of the shareholders.

The new year will start with a Breakfast under the Gums trees on January 26 and the ever popular quiz for all to enjoy, we hope to see you all at 8:30 to start the year as a community. On behalf of the Board and their families I would like to wish everyone a happy and safe festive season. Ian O'Brien

White Chocolate and Cranberry Shortbreads



000000000 Ingredients: 2½ cups of plain flour, 200g diced cold butter, ½ cup of caster sugar, 2 teaspoons vanilla, 2 large egg yolks, 100g white chocolate, 30ml of cream, ½ cup of diced cranberries, icing sugar.



Method: Put flour, butter, sugar, vanilla and egg yolks in a processor and blend until mixture changes into dough. Turn onto lightly floured board and form into a sausage shape about 25cm long and 3cm diameter. Wrap tightly in cling wrap and chill for 1 hour. Preheat oven to 180C—fan 160C. Cut the dough into 5mm thin slices. Bake on lined trays for 15mins. Leave to cool. Melt chocolate and cream and then stir in chopped cranberries. Join the biscuits together with this mixture .Enjoy
